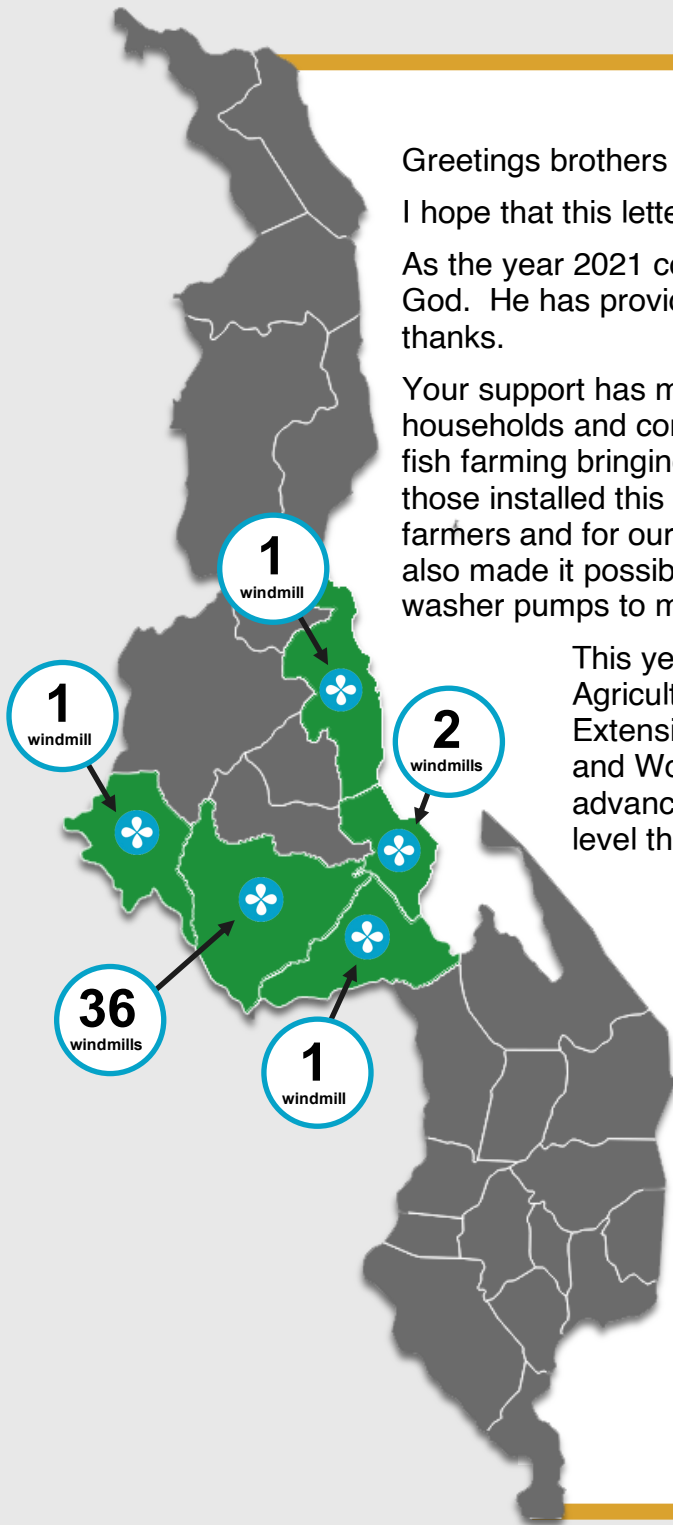

WINDMILLS MAKE A DIFFERENCE FOR FAMILIES

The Banda family from Chipokosa village own 4 acres of land giving them room to have a big garden. In the past they only cultivated a small part of the garden because they could not manage to irrigate using water can. When Africa Windmill Project came to their area all this changed. Mr. Banda has 19 people in his household and has been a member of the Chipokosa agriculture club for over 4 years. He has been able to learn from Africa Windmill Project how to properly practice irrigation farming and in 2021 received a windmill for his skill as a lead farmer. This has changed their lives because in the past he struggled to take care of his big family but now he is able to take care of his crops and in turn the household is cared for. Having such a big family means more mouths to feed and more bodies to clothe and take good care of. Harvesting enough food was always an issue but now with the windmill, they are food secure and also have enough surplus to sell.

They have been farming maize and sometime sweet potatoes. Having a windmill has not only helped them use their whole garden but has also improved the yield of their crops. When they sell the extra produce at market they have money to buy agriculture imputes for the next growing season. "One thing I like about the windmill you have given me is that it allows us to cultivate a larger piece of land this is something that me and my family never did, thank you so much for this technology," says Mr. Banda.

Most families in Malawi struggle to produce food because they don't have the right skills and irrigation technology to use. Africa Windmill Project impacts this reality by providing farmers with agriculture training and windmills ending the hunger season for families.



“When Mr. Chingwengwe started practicing the skills he learned from the trainings, he saw a change in his yields that he sold. He eventually made MK35,000 (\$47 USD) from irrigating with water cans.

“When I made my first sell I never gave up, I made sure I worked hard and until I made another profit of 160,000 (\$213 USD) which I used to payback all my debts, now I am a debt free man.”
